CASA MORRA is the new space designed by Giuseppe Morra at Palazzo Cassano Ayerbo D'Aragona in Naples.

This is the next step in the Neapolitan patron of the arts' great adventure as he transfers his collection, accumulated in over forty years of activity on the international arts scene, to this new location.

Casa Morra will not be a static exhibition space but will become an archive of contemporary art, a place of dynamism encouraging reflection and research on society and its development.

A 'house of ideas' where the past blends into the present and the future, defying time with a programme mapped out until 2116.

Beppe Morra has in fact planned exhibitions for the next 100 years, using a 'snakes and ladders' system of references, cross-overs and turnings back. The exhibition cycles are governed by the alchemy of the numbers 3 and 7 to coincide with the number of artists on show or the number of works and exhibition sequences.

Giuseppe Morra will move into his new house, a monastery in the Materdei district, with over two thousand works of art accumulated over time, making it the New Medina of contemporary art in Naples. The house will be a workshop planning the next hundred years of events, entwining past and future, renewing and multiplying concepts and becoming a labyrinth of study and encounter.

News of the event is not only a testimony to the theme of the vitality of those involved, but offers a vision of a new private institution rich in value - a change of scale for the Fondazione Morra and the Naples Art District.

The snakes and ladders game is not a reference to the labyrinth in Crete, but to the exuberant Chartres maze.

Alpha and Omega are one and the same, and the need to go back to the beginning becomes increasingly pressing. The Manifesto is not an image of disorder, but of the complexity of the issues revealed by the simplicity of the path that always leads to Casa Morra. With each round trip, the Casa grows on the cognitive level, becoming the largest in the current city, bringing to it the chance to recognize that is an open, inclusive and international contemporary reality.

Casa Morra continues the **Gioco dell'Oca** ("Snakes and Ladders") idea, opening its third year of activity with the artists featured in the collection. Once again, the number 3: symbol of the power of energy, reflecting the multifaceted and dynamic identity of Casa Morra, as it brings together the arts, education, research, and experimentation, as well as building a relationship with the local area. Casa Morra's personality, expressing a plurality of languages and trends in one place, comes across particularly effectively in the *3P+B* exhibition with works by Luca Maria Patella, Cesare Pietroiusti, Vettor Pisani and with Nanni Balestrini.

Luca Maria Patella is a versatily artist. With a penetrating gaze upon science and philosophy, he is a poet and photographer, a sculptor, a performer, and video artist. On display here are the *Talking Trees*, which involve the viewer in a sensory, dreamlike and poetic journey. By placing our ear near the trunk and branches, we can listen to the trees murmuring, and whispering ironic-creative or scientific speeches. Patella creates a multimedia space in which the word becomes the lifeblood of a synaesthetic game.

Through the **Gioco dell'Oca** (Snakes and Ladders game), **Cesare Pietroiusti** participates in the encounter between different times and meanings taking place at Casa Morra. For this exhibition, he presents *Lavori da vergognarsi* (Works to be Ashamed of), or Il riscatto delle opere neglette (The Redemption of Neglected Works), a retrospective of pieces that have never been shown before, "works that", as Pietroiusti says, "I never used because once I had made them I thought they seemed inadequate, out of context, or too similar to works by other artists". Exhibiting them now, the artist reflects on the relationship between the wish to present a work and the possibility of fulfilling this desire by tricking it, i.e., by exhibiting the "wrong works".

In the work of **Vettor Pisani** "it is difficult to establish linguistic supremacy, if not perhaps under the meaning a total immersion of life in art" (I. Tomassoni in *Vettor Pisani*. *Apocalypse Now. Carpe Diem*, 2012). In *II mio cuore* è un cupo abisso (My heart is a dark abyss, tr.) (2004) Pisani stages "obsessive metaphors" the sacred and the profane. He focuses on themes of Symbolist art in a dialogue between painting and text.

Nanni Balestrini, a tireless experimenter and active member of the *entourage* of Italian poets of the 1960s, Balestrini reconfigured the language of everyday life. His *Colonna Verbale (Verbal Column*, tr.), crowns the word as the key element of grammar and of verbal and visual communication, just as the column is the supporting structure in architecture. Also on show is the world's longest film, *Tristanoil* (2,400 hours of screen time) with which Balestrini denounces the destruction of the planet through the exploitation of its resources.



CONCERT BY GIROLAMO DE SIMONE "PRAYER FOR ALDO BRAIBANTI" -HOMAGE TO GIUSEPPE CHIARI

On the 50th anniversary of the publication of Giuseppe Chiari's *Preghiera per Aldo Braibanti* (*Prayer for Aldo Braibanti*, tr.), **Girolamo De Simone** presents a national preview of the text accompanied by the music that Chiari composed for De Simone before his death. The event, with a reading of Giuseppe Chiari's text and Girolamo De Simone's piano performance, aims to focus on "old and new fascisms", on the current relevance of homophobia and on homosexuality considered as a merely "medical issue" and on the trials that were once held against the "freedom to live".

THE OPENING OF THE AVELLA LABORATORY

Casa Morra welcomes to its premises the **Vittorio Avella Laboratory**. The Vittorio Avella Laboratory is an art printing house founded by Vittorio Avella and Antonio Sgambati in 1978 in Nola (Naples) with the aim of preserving manual knowledge of chalcographic techniques and recovering the link between art and craftsmanship. The installation of the **Vittorio Avella Laboratory** at Casa Morra is part of the **II Quartiere dell'Arte** ("Art District") project, a journey of renewal of urban standards focusing on cultural and creative production, namely the artistic craftsmanship that is still alive in the city and through which it is possible to set up a process of evolution in the relationship between art, the city, and creative communities.
